

Hmong Language School offered an intensive summer course every day for two weeks this summer. July 10th was the last day of class. Although only six students attended, we had a good time. Also it gave me the opportunity to get to know the students better and help them learn, more importantly, about Jesus and Heaven.

Do you remember the student we shared with you about in the previous newsletter? He, his siblings, and mother wanted to attend church with us but the father was not ready. Well, he and his siblings came back to Hmong School this summer. They were very eager and wanted to know about life in Heaven. After knowing that there will be a new Heaven and new Earth, there will be no more thirst and pain, and especially there will be no more death, this particular student said, "My parents and siblings better believe in Jesus because I do! I'm not going down THERE but up there in HEAVEN". He went on and said a quick prayer like this: "Please God make me be an Asian as I am in Heaven".

It was truly a Holy Spirit moment for me. Many people say that confessing Jesus as Lord is easy. However, no one can do so and really mean it, unless through the Holy Spirit. One by one, the seed is being planted in the hearts of these students. We pray that all of our non-Christian students will one day confess that Jesus is Lord and Savior. Praise God for the Holy Spirit and His work!

A Note from Vicar Doua

July was a busy month for me. As mentioned in the last newsletter, I agreed to carry on the mission outreach and church planting here in the CNH District to the Hmong, as well as other Southeast Asians.

I met with St. Andrews Lutheran Church in Stockton in early July to start the process for Tao Lee to be commissioned as Deacon. Lee is from our Hmong sister congregation at Peace Lutheran in Fresno, CA. If the commission process goes well, Lee will be commissioned sometime in August or early September. Also, First Lutheran Church in Yuba City opens its door for Hmong ministry. However, as Jesus said, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore pray earnestly to the Lord of harvest to send out laborers into his harvest." (Matthew 9:37-38). We need your prayers for faithful servants who are willing to do the Lord's mission.

I attended a meeting on July 3rd where I met with the Southeast Asian deacons and pastors here in Central Valley. After the meeting, I found out that the pastors and deacons are facing numerous challenges daily in their personal and ministry life. Our pastors and deacons have to have their own full-time jobs to support their family financially while doing God's

JULY 9 NEWS RELEASE FROM CONCORDIA SEMINARY, ST. LOUIS

Rev. Kou Seying (Kxf. Nyaj Kub Thoj) to join faculty Hmong pastor brings extensive multicultural ministry experience

Rev. Laokouxang (Kou) Seying will be joining the faculty as associate dean for urban and cross cultural ministries and associate professor of practical theology beginning with the 2015-16 academic year. Seying brings extensive experience as a pastor and teacher, as well as in developing multicultural ministry within <u>The Lutheran Church—</u> Missouri Synod (LCMS).

The first ordained HMong pastor in the LCMS, Seying has served the California-Nevada-Hawaii District (CNH) since 2004 as a deployed mission developer/strategist of Joy of Harvest Ministries through St. Paul Lutheran Church in Merced, California, and Greenhaven Lutheran Church in Sacramento, California.

Much of his multicultural ministry experience was in HMong, Southeast Asian, and African immigrant communities, especially in the areas of leadership training. Besides serving in the LCMS CNH District for over a decade, he served as pastor of HMong Lutheran Church in St. Paul, Minnesota, from 1991-1995. Seying also taught religion and theology at Concordia University, St. Paul, from 1992-2004, and was the missionary-at-large for the LCMS Minnesota South District from 1995-1998.

Seying was involved in early discussions within the LCMS that led to pastoral training programs for immigrant and nontraditional students. His leadership training program and participation in multiethnic leadership training has provided leaders for many language-specific ministries and led many to the Holy Ministry from various ethnic groups. In addition to writing devotional materials, mission articles, and frequently giving presentations on missiology, Seying is the editor-in-chief for various major theological works in the HMong language.

"Our Lutheran faithfulness to the Word of God and our confessions to the world have caught the attention of many language groups from beyond the borders of LCMS," said Seying. "Many Christian groups across America and from around the world are craving a good theological education across cultures. Concordia Seminary is poised to cultivate the rich heritage of the church, accurately interpret the present, and stand ready to enrich the future."

"Taking the Good News of Jesus Christ to immigrants is an amazing opportunity that the Lord has put before us, and I'm grateful that Concordia Seminary can be a key partner in this Gospel mission," said Dr. Dale A. Meyer, president of Concordia Seminary. "Rev. Seying will strengthen the work of our Center for Hispanic Studies and Ethnic Immigrant Institute of Theology. And his experience as a missionary, pastor, and teacher will be of great benefit also to our residential students and the congregations that they will serve."

Among Seying's other experiences: aviation and soccer. He holds a commercial pilot license and a flight instructor certificate. Beyond his dean and teaching responsibilities, he will coach the soccer team at Concordia Seminary.

Seying holds a Master of Divinity from Concordia Theological Seminary, Fort Wayne, Indiana (CTS); has studied Systematic Theology at Luther Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota; and is completing his doctorate of philosophy at CTS. His dissertation, which is in progress, is Cast Away the Spirits—A Study of Conversion from HMong Traditional Religion to Christianity.

BACK IN HISTORY......by Theresa Lund, Historian

From the August 2088 St. Paul Messenger

St. Paul Sunday School collected \$844.20 during the year 1959. Of this \$157.92 was given on "Mission Sundays". After buying their supplies, including VBS materials, the bank balance at the end of the year was \$176.46.

St. Paul observed the 10th anniversary of the dedication of the parish hall/chapel on Sunday, October 4, 1959. The Rev. George W. Hoffman, under whose pastorate the building was built, served as the guest speaker. The Rev. E.A. Wessel, current pastor, was the liturgist. A light supper and fellowship followed the vesper. Following supper, early pictures of the church were shown and a tape recording of the 1949 dedication service was played. Rev. Hoffman served in Merced from 1944-1953. he was in Ferndale, Calif. until November 1958, when he retired and returned to Merced to make his home.

MISSION SAFARI

The Women's Guild went on a Mission Safari that included a progressive dinner in October, 1959. The menu, décor and program at each stop was based on the country visited.

The trip began in the church parish hall where an African jungle provided the background for the serving of juice and appetizers. Mrs. Leon Snyder reported on missions in Nigeria and Ghana. Co-hostesses were Mrs. Norman Grossman and Mrs. Leonard Glusing.

The travelers were greeted with "Aloha" by women garbed in mu-mus and leis at the church Parsonage on 23rd St., which was the E.A. Wessel residence. After the salad course, the group heard Mrs. Floyd Schelby speak of the work of the Lutheran Church in the Hawaiian Islands. Mrs. Schelby, who is President of the California-Nevada District LWML, recently returned from a week in Hawaii. While there she conducted a two-day Guidance Institute for the LWML. Assisting at this stop were Mrs. Wessel, Mrs.. William Jueneman, and Mrs. Leland Miracle.

Hong Kong was the destination at the home of Mrs. Ray Menssen, Jr. A skit on the Lutheran School System in that area was given by Mrs. Raymond Lund and Miss Evelyn Pfau. Concordia School, Hong Kong, is the Synod's largest with 1,100 students. Chop Suey was served in an oriental atmosphere. Mrs. William Petzold assisted.

Tiny parasols decorated the desert plates which were served in Japan. The final stop was made at Home of Mrs. Willliam Miller. Beautiful Japanese objects decorated the rooms. Mrs. Ray Nutcher reported on Mission Work in Japan. Also serving were Mrs. Frank Hart and Mrs. John Carr.


